"I have spent a lot of time making it easier for the women coming behind me," she said.

Loetscher has worked to make taking extended family leave for the birth of a child a normal thing at the firm for both women and men. Additionally, she's worked to ensure that a problem she was having as a woman lawyer wasn't just solved for her, but for others in the firm.

As a shareholder, she's also advocating all the time for creating a workplace that's inclusive and where people feel appreciated.

"We want a workplace where people are happy and come wanting to be there doing good work," she said.
